What is PEAK?



Per IDEA, each state must have a designated Parent Training & Information Center (PTI).

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PEAK serves families, self-advocates (individuals with disabilities), educators, related services providers & more as Colorado's federally designated PTI.







What do we do?

We provided general information and assistance to **287,613 families** and professionals, through:

- 88,560 website hits,
- 10,663 blog and event sites visits
- 7253 followers on Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and Linkedin

The Parent Advisor team at PEAK Parent Center provided intensive, general, and targeted technical assistance through one-on-one individualized problem-solving and information dissemination to 1,021 duplicated families and youth during the reporting period.







- We teach parents, student, educators, and professionals the skills they need to successfully educate students with all types of disabilities and abilities.
- We believe that all children, including children with disabilities can learn and participate in their neighborhood schools. An inclusive childhood leads to inclusion in adulthood.

- Share tools & resources that can be used to intentionally identify networks for transition for students and families





Building networks for families

- · Parent groups, training & networking
- Create new ways to build a sustainable long-term network of unpaid support who will be there after you are gone
- Strategically support the development of meaningful relationships that are capacity focused and lead to living a good life of belonging
- Safely transfer roles and responsibilities to our child and a trusted group of individuals who love and support them.
- Share your journey, ask questions, and learn from each other





Building networks for students

- Include peers in IEP Process
- · Consider student led IEPs
- See students apart from labels and identify their strengths

- Through my gifts and strengths develop my identity which leads to capacity - based connections and relationships with others in the community
- Intentionally invite others in to participate in my life in meaningful and practical ways
- · Take Up Space


